Travelling to communities is a great opportunity for the MASRC to build relationships and to listen and learn more about how to better build sport and recreation in each community. As we continue to work with communities, we hope to help empower Indigenous people and walk with them to create sustainable programming that will benefit everyone. #### Outdoor Rink in Bloodvein

Bloodvein, MB is a participant in our Sport for Social Development program (see page 4). After a couple community visits and discussions with leaders and community members, our program facilitator helped identify a need in the community and encouraged them to build an outdoor rink.

Chief and Council agreed to fund the material for the outdoor rink and the MASRC took on the role of rallying youth in the community to help build the outdoor rink.



After 4 days of hard work, Bloodvein now has a new recreation facility and 7 youth who now know what it takes to build and maintain an outdoor rink.



#### Lost in a Snow Maze on Louis Riel Day

In celebration of Louis Riel day the MASRC hosted free snowshoe clinics at the largest snow maze in the world!

We were set up in a wonderful fire pit snow shelter and equipped 94 participants to try snowshoeing for the first time. And even with all of the activities offered at the Snow maze we were very pleased to have enhanced the winter experience for these people. We also had kids try snowshoe soccer and snowshoe hockey.





#### **NAIG 2020 UPDATE**

The North American Indigenous Games (NAIG) Council and NAIG 2020 Host Society have announced that the scheduled games to be held July 12-18 in Halifax, Nova Scotia have been postponed due to the ongoing situation with COVID-19.

At this point the MASRC does not have any further information about the rescheduling, other than the Host Society is working very hard to get things confirmed as soon as possible for July of 2021.

Here's what we do know:

- 1. It will still be called 2020 NAIG
- There will not be another set of tryouts for any Team Manitoba NAIG 2020 teams. All teams will remain as they currently are. This is the same for coaches and chaperones.
- No refunds will be processed. If an athlete would like to give up their roster spot and no longer attend 2020 NAIG – a refund can be processed, and the spot will be offered to an alternate player.
- 4. No athletes "age out" age eligibility years stay the same.

We will keep everyone updated on new information as it comes to us.

This is incredibly hard and uncharted times for all of us. We appreciate your patience, time and commitment in giving our youth the opportunity for athletic excellence.

On March 12<sup>th</sup> the Aboriginal Sport Circle (ASC) was advised of Hockey Canada's cancellation of all sanctioned events until further notice. As a result the ASC announced the postponement of the National Aboriginal Hockey Championships (NAHC) May 9-16, 2020 in Regina, Saskatchewan.

In an effort to honour and celebrate the athletes that will be aging out of eligibility for the NAHC this year, the MASRC will be showcasing these 12 athletes individually with features on our social media. Each week an athlete from each team (male and female) will be featured. Full write-ups will be posted on the MASRC website as well.

# Introducing Sport for Social Development

The Sport for Social Development program began in August 2019 with the MASRC.

"Sport for social development is defined as the use of sport for social development for the purpose of achieving targeted social outcomes.

The Sport for Social Development in Indigenous Communities (SSDIC) component is a response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Calls to Action, which identified 4 key social development needs of Indigenous communities.

Those needs form the specific targeted social outcomes of the SSDIC component:

- improved health, education, and employability; and
- the reduction of at-risk behaviour."

We are grateful for the contribution of the Government of Canada through Sport Canada as this has allowed the MASRC to increase its capacity as well as increase our ability to work closely with our communities throughout Manitoba.

In 2018 our sport consultants travelled throughout Manitoba to engage in discussion about sport and recreation needs in Indigenous communities. A common response was that recreation leaders and community champions were tired. There is a lack of *relevant* education opportunities and a lack ongoing professional support.

Communities also stated that if there were more sport and recreation opportunities in the community, then we would see an increase in youth participation and as a result we would see an increase in school attendance. Their theory behind this statement is that with an increase in participation comes physical literacy and enhanced confidence in being physically active. With this confidence we will see a higher interest in school

sports and because of this we will see a higher academic attendance.

In order to test this theory, the MASRC has developed a mentorship program. The MASRC has pre-selected 14 communities to participate in the first few years of the program. We have hired 3 full time program facilitators whose responsibilities are to help communities identify potential leaders who are interested in learning how to create and implement sport and recreation programs for their community. The facilitators will act as mentors and offer resources and ongoing support for the community leaders.

Since October, our program facilitators have travelled 32 times to 21 communities. During this time, our facilitators and sport consultants have been able to build significant relationships with community members, school teachers, health care professionals, and chief and council members. With the focus on building relationships, the MASRC is able to provide ongoing communication and support.

In addition to the mentorship program, the Sport for Social Development program includes the urban bike program "Cycle Indigena Winnipeg" (see page 5), the Inclusive Sport program, and the Urban Youth Nights on Saturdays.

"I was very fortunate to have been introduced to the Sport for Social Development program by Season Kirkwood and her colleagues when they attended Grand Rapids School for programming. Before I met Season with MASRC I had this goal to bring rec programs back to our community but had tons of barriers. There was lack of funding, equipment and volunteers. But that wasn't the only barrier. I felt stuck. I felt like I didn't know how to get started or where to get started. We then met Season and she gave me the guidance and confidence I needed to get started. The Sport for Social Development program has helped me gain a position with MCN band as a recreation director. It has helped me gain access to online coaching programs and certification. They have gave me opportunities to provide the community with other sport programs that the community is desperately in need of. They have provided me with ideas and touch base weekly to see how planning is going and if I need any supports. I am thankful that I have had the opportunity to be involved with this program. They are very helpful and their guidance and supports are more than I can ask for. I look forward to the future of our recreation program and that is because I know we have support through this program. Thank you." - Jeremy Ballantyne

#### **Cycle Indigena Winnipeg**

In October the MASRC launched its first urban bike initiative: *Cycle Indigena Winnipeg*. Cycle Indigena Winnipeg was designed to address one of the barriers that Indigenous students face when moving to Winnipeg for their studies: transportation.

Through this initiative the MASRC aims to give Indigenous students the ability to address this barrier by giving a bike to 35 students. A bike can give Indigenous students a sense of freedom, comfort, and safety in the city of Winnipeg. This will also help in alleviating the sense of isolation due to the culture shock of living in a busy, fast-paced urban environment.


The MASRC worked closely with the WRENCH Winnipeg, a local community bike shop, to design a bicycle that would fit the needs of a Winnipeg commuter. These bikes were built as simple single speed bikes that are easy to ride and easy to fix. The WRENCH also incorporated a number of theft proof features. Along with the bicycle each participant will receive the highest rated ABUS lock, a helmet, a battery powered light set, a hand pump, front and rear full fenders, and a heavy duty basket.

## 2019 Awards

### Female Athlete Award - Heaven Moneyas Lake St. Martin First Nation

In 2019, Heaven played for Team Manitoba at the 2019 National Aboriginal Hockey Championships. Heaven also played for the AA Titans and was named MVP for the AA Titans at the end of their season.



In the fall of 2019 Heaven moved to Pilot Mound where she now plays for the Buffaloes. She has taken whopping 536 shots this vear and has saved most of them!

Heaven is described by her friends as a funny and

very dedicated student athlete. Through her hard work and commitment, Heaven has done a great job representing herself, her family, as well as the program on and off the ice. Heaven made the transition to her new school, to follow her dream as a hockey player as well as to excel in academics. Not only is she a hockey player, but she is a MB provincial level boxer, and is tackling the sport of wrestling as well. She was named to represent Manitoba at the 2020 NAIG games in the sport of Wrestling.

## Male Athlete Award - Conner Roulette Misipawistik Cree Nation



After competing in Hockey for 12 years, Conner played his first WHL game with the Seattle Thunderbirds in January 2019. accomplishment for a 16-year-old. He represented Manitoba at the Canada Winter Games in Red Deer in February 2019 and was awarded Impact Player of the Year at the annual Winnipeg AAA Hockey League Awards Night in April 2019. In May 2019, Conner played on Team Manitoba at the National Aboriginal Hockey Championships in Whitehorse. His team won the Gold Medal and he was named the Top Forward at the Championship. At the 2019 U16 World Junior Ball Hockey championships in the Czech Republic, Conner was named team captain and they won the GOLD medal. Conner was named Top Forward at Worlds. He was selected by Hockey Canada to participate at the National under-17 Development camp. The Canadian Ball Hockey Association awarded Conner with the Logan Schatz Memorial Award (top Jr Ball Hockey player). And to end things off, Conner was chosen to play with Team Canada at the 2019 World Under 17 Hockey Challenge Tournament.



## Female Coaching Award - Danielle Daniels Opaskwayak (Long Plain First Nation)



Danielle Daniels is one busy Math teacher! In addition to her teaching, Danielle is also the Female Junior Varsity and Female Varsity Basketball coach for the Oscar Collegiate Lathlin Wolverines

Opaskwayak Cree Nation (OCN). Her teams attended several tournaments including the "AA" Zone 11 Sr Girls Basketball Championships, the Swan Valley Credit Union Invitational Varsity Girls Basketball Classic and the St. Boniface Diocesan Centurion Classic. Outside of the school Danielle is the Head Coach for The Pas Thunder 16U Female Club team. The Thunder attended the 2019 Manitoba Club Basketball Championship in May in Winnipeg. And to top off her year, Danielle was selected to be the Head Coach for 19U Female Basketball for Team Manitoba that will be heading to NAIG.

## Male Coaching Award - Curtis Nepinak Waterhen (Skownan First Nation)

Curtis Nepinak has been coaching in Manitoba for the past 19 years! In 2019 alone. he coached Jr High and JV Volleyball, Floor Hockey and Basketball at Skownan school and in the community U11 and U9 Baseball and



is currently coaching Initiation and Novice Hockey for Winnipegosis!

Coach Nepinak makes it his responsibility, for students to not only succeed on the court/ice but in life as well. He teaches his athletes to be leaders. how to be organized and the importance of time management. He always encourages his students to persevere and to improve by practicing and taking the time to work on specific skills. Coach Nepinak has been an everyday role model, not only to his athletes but to his colleagues as well. Coach Nepinak often goes beyond his coaching responsibilities from buying his athletes dinner and finding hand me down equipment to working one on one with kids who need extra help and showing up to every practice, game and team bonding activity. Many parents have seen the efforts Mr. Nepinak puts in and thank him for loving their children, teaching them, encouraging them to remain positive during harder losses. He is known for being patient and kind, and giving everything, he has to make kids sport better.
